This concert is a rare occasion where, in a programme lasting an hour, we will sing seven settings of the *Gloria* and two of the *Magnificat*.

The brief for Mozart's Vespers (or Vesperae solennes de Confessore KV 339 - 1780 to be precise) was that the work should contain Psalms 109, 110, 111, 112, 116 and the Magnificat. Each Psalm was to end with a setting of the Gloria. The brief also directs that the whole was to last no longer than forty five minutes, and it was to be set for choir, four soloists, full orchestra (including trumpets and trombones), drums, and two organs (one for the choir and another for the orchestra and soloists). Setting the long text in such a short piece would have been unusual. For example Psalm 109, the Dixit Dominus, is usually a thirty minute piece in its own right. Mozart was therefore necessarily economical with the music and makes up for it in the orchestration. The orchestration in tonight's programme is for strings and organ, and calls on the 18th century tradition that allows the director of the church musicians to amend the orchestration to suit the size of the performance. Although only 23 when he wrote these settings, some of Mozart's more sombre moments and perhaps the most familiar movement, the Laudate Dominum, would have been shaped by the death of his mother in 1778.

JS Bach's Harpsichord concerto in F minor BWV 1056 proves that it is no secret that one of the hallmarks of a good baroque composer was being good at recycling. Bach's famous A minor violin concerto also exists as a G minor harpsichord concerto, while the F minor concerto that you will hear tonight comes from two sources – the outer two movements from a violin concerto in G minor and the middle largo movement from an oboe concerto. This movement later provided the material for the overture of cantata BWV 156 "Ich steh mit einem Fuss im Grabe".

Antonio Vivaldi's (1678-1741) catalogue is both vast and varied. There are literally hundreds of concerti for most baroque instruments such as violin, oboe and bassoon, a dozen operas and countless choral works. His most popular choral work is his Gloria in D, but the Magnificat (1715) in tonight's programme is just as brilliant and fiery, and perhaps more closely related in style to his concerti. The nine short movements provide a sample of the composer's wider repertoire and his diversity of expression. Magnificat Anima Meum (movement 1) and Sucepit Israel (7) are powerfully chromatic; there is stormy orchestration with a simple but bold declaration from the choir in the Fecit Potentiam (4), immediately followed by unison writing in the Deposuit Potentes (5). As a piece it deserves to rival its big sibling, the Gloria, in popularity with performers and audiences.

Soloists

Jenny Keates read history at Cambridge University, where she sang in Queens and Corpus Christi College Chapel choirs. Her choral activities since then include performances and recordings with many of London's leading chamber choirs, including the Chorus of the Academy of St Martin's in the Field, the Corydon Singers, the Holst Singers and the Tallis Chamber Choir.

She is a member of Hounslow Community Opera, where she has taken part in staged performances of opera extracts, singing roles such as Susannah, Zerlina, Norina and Gilda. She sang Belinda in their recent production of *Dido and Aeneas*. She played Lucy Brown in Hounslow Music Theatre Company's production of Weill's *Threepenny Opera* at the Waterman's Theatre, Brentford. She took a post-graduate diploma in voice at the London College of Music, and is now studying with Amanda Thane. In her spare time, she works for Campaign magazine as a sub-editor.



Louise Coucill began singing at the age of 12 and developed her music education through to A-Level. During this time, she won first prize in the Sefton West Lancashire Music Festival and performed for Princess Anne. In 1999, she moved from North West England to study music at the London College of Music. Here she was involved in many choral activities and performed in musicals at the Hampton Hill Playhouse. She was awarded her Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award at St James' Palace in 2002. Since graduating from university she began a career in banking and is a

corporate bank manager specialising in property and construction.



Ieuan Morgan Jones studied at the London College of Music with Eileen Price and Peter Savidge. He was a member of the National Youth Music Theatre for two years and performed all over the country including a season at the Assembly Rooms at the Edinburgh Festival and at the Royal Albert Hall for the Lord Lloyd Weber's 50th birthday celebration. Whilst at college, Ieuan took many roles in productions including Pablo in Howard Goodall's *Days of Hope* and the deceased Kurt Weill in *Weill Women*, a review of the composer's work set in Purgatory. He was also a recipient of the 2001 award for performance. Outside engagements included a gala performance of *Les Miserables* at Cardiff Castle and a concert of film

music by Ennio Morricone at the Barbican Hall conducted by the composer.

As a tenor soloist, leuan has worked with choirs all over the country. Works include Mozart's *Coronation Mass*, Schubert's *Mass in G*, Handel's *Messiah* and a semi staged performance of Monterverdi's *Orfeo*. Abroad he has sung in Frankfurt, Verona and sang in Paris for the eve of the Millennium.

Recordings include *Andrew Lloyd Weber's 50th Birthday Celebration, Ennio Morricone at the Barbican* Radio 3 and the soundtrack for *Telephone Detectives* by Kevin Farrell. Most recently leuan was involved in the concept of *Behind Both Doors*, a new musical by Alex Loveless based on the novel by Tony Warren, the creator of Coronation Street.



Robert Winslade Anderson first studied and worked in accounting. He completed his undergraduate studies at the Royal Academy of Music and is currently in his first year on the Royal Academy Opera Course. His current teachers are Mark Wildman and Antony Saunders. His concert and recital programmes have been wide and varied, ranging from Bach to Bax. Recent performances include Mozart's Requiem with the Wavery Singers and for the Mayfair Concert Series. Future concerts include Rossini's Petite Messe Solennelle with the East London Chorus and Verdi's Requiem with Burgesshill Choral Society.

On the Operatic stage, Mr Anderson recently performed the role of "Lunardo" from Wolf-Ferrari's *School for Fathers* for Royal Academy Opera. In the Autumn he performed the role of Bounafade from Haydn's *Il Mondo Della Luna*. His other operatic performances in scenes whilst at the Academy included Figaro (*Le Nozze di Figaro*), Allazim (*Zaide*), Leporello (*Don Giovanni*) and Don Alphonso (*Così fan tutte*). He appeared with the chorus of Opera Holland Park in Last season's production of Donizetti's *Lucia di Lammermoor* and Verdi's *Stiffelio*. Future engagements include the role of Dulcamara in a concert performance (highlights) of Donizetti's *L'elisir d'amore* in Holland with Pegasus Opera.

A former ABRSM Scholar, Robert is currently supported by the generosity of the CHASE Fund, The Peter Moores Foundation, Sophie's Silver Lining Fund, the Lynn Foundation, the Matthew Holder Charitable Trust, the Mrs. Wingfield's Charitable Trust and the Josephine Baker Trust.



Lee Shiel studied piano and organ at the London College of Music, where he also played violin in the College orchestra. He took his GLCM (Hons) in 1996 and his Post-Graduate Certificate in 1997. Since then, he has worked continuously as pianist for a wide range of theatre and opera groups, ballet schools and as an accompanist to singers and instrumentalists, and has played organ for a number of recitals, including appearing in the Brighton Festival. Lee has been organist at St Thomas the Apostle Church in Hanwell since 2002 & also has plans for future organ & harpsichord recitals
